VBP Outreach has Grown but our Original Policy is the Same

Victory Baptist Press was established in 1984 by Dr. Thomas Woodward. The original purpose of printing and distributing the Scriptures without charge is still our policy, and since our beginning millions of scripture portions, New Testaments, and whole Bibles have been printed in eleven languages, (English, Spanish, Cebuano,

Tagalog, Telugu, French Creol, Pidgin, Portuguese, Romanian, Lugando and Russian), shipped to thirty-nine foreign countries (Peru, Venezuela, Cape Verde, El Salvador, Panama, Romania, Kuwait, Brazil, Uganda, England, Philippine Islands, Mexico, Cuba, Spain, Paraguay, Bolivia, Haiti, Trinidad, Puerto Rico, Russia, Australia, Belize, Costa Rica, Zaire, Nigeria, New Guinea, Honduras, Canada, Georgia, E. Europe, Mozambique, Zambia, Nigeria, Ghana, W. Africa, Germany, Guatemala, Chile, Dominican Republic), and to every state in the United States. As of this date, the Lord has met every need, and we have honored the desire of our founder and provided every Scripture VBP has printed absolutely free of charge.

VBP Financial Support has Dropped 40%

Because of the economic situation in America, many churches have been forced to cut their missions giving and very few are adding new missionaries or missions projects to their missions programs. We estimate that in the last year VBP has lost about 40% of its monthly support from churches, and therefore we would be forced to close the print shop were it not for other means of raising the needed funds. Though the regular monthly support is far short of what is needed, we can not operate without it. When we add the funds from special one-time offerings, print jobs we do for others, and our online bookstore sales, we are able to continue printing Scriptures as always, but many times the requests for Scriptures get turned down because there's just not enough being printed to meet the need. We must do more!

The New Associate Program Could be the Answer to the Financial Need

We realize that the economic situation has caused financial hardships on other ministries as well. Some good evangelists and other missionaries are not able to operate on love offerings alone. I believe the Lord has given us a plan whereby others of like faith and practice can continue their ministries as usual, and at the same time, have a significant increase in their own personal income. The **Associate Program** is designed for others to cooperate with us with no obligation whatsoever, and for both

Dear Friends and Supporters,

God is good! The Gospel is still the good news that most of the world has not yet heard. God has heard the cry of a few more folks that need to hear the Gospel, and He has provided money for another truckload of paper that will be printed into Spanish Bibles. These Bibles will be sent to Juarez, Mexico, reportedly the most dangerous city in the western hemisphere at this time. The apostle Paul said in Romans 5:20, "...where sin abounded, grace did much more abound." According to that verse, there is no better place at this time to send the Gospel than to Juarez, Mexico. There is a group of Christians trying to evangelize that area, and I have been told some testimonies of the wonderful grace of God already in that city. Many thousands of tracts have been purchased and are being distributed. Those that respond and come to church will be given a New Testament or Bible. Please pray that the grace of God will abound in many hearts in that city and they will be a testimony to what the grace of God can do.

Even as we begin to print these Bibles, we still have English and Spanish New Testaments to collate and bind. God has blessed in that area as well. We have had a bindery system that has the capacity to collate, bind, and trim a New Testament all in one operation but have never gotten it all to work together well enough to use it to its full potential. In the last few weeks, God has allowed me to concentrate a little more on that, and progress is being made. There are many moving parts and paper can be very finicky. When more than one thing at a time is acting up it is hard to trouble shoot one problem at a time. Progress has been made, but there is still more that needs to be done. Please pray that God will allow us to use the machinery He has given us to its fullest potential so we can get the word of God out on the field as quickly as possible. The English New Testaments are available to those that can use them, while the Spanish New Testaments are slated to go to Peru.

Another big help in the shop is the fact that we have had more volunteers out to help us lately. This is due mainly to Sister Betty Waters. She was our church secretary, but recently decided to retire from that job. But no true servant of God can retire from God's work. She has become our volunteer coordinator. People in church interested in helping in the shop were told to see Sister Betty Waters. She has their phone numbers and works out times when they can come and help. So far this system has worked well for us. Please pray that folks will continue to come and that God will continue to supply the materials we need to keep them busy.

On the home front, our daughter Sarah had surgery to remove a portion of her colon that had been damaged due to her Crohn's disease. Thank you for your prayers on her behalf. She is doing much better now and is almost like a new person. Even as her father, I had not realized how much she had been affected by the disease. Please continue to keep her in vour pravers as this is not a cure. The doctor told us that when the colon gets infected like hers was, it tends to make all kind of things go wacky in the body while it tries to deal with the problem. Taking out the bad part calms all that down and usually, but not always, puts the Crohn's into remission, as well. Please pray that this will be the case with her.

I recently attended a family reunion for my mother's side of the family in Tennessee. We stayed at the home of my aunt whose husband had passed away last fall. He was a dear Christian man, one of my favorite uncles from my childhood. As I sat in her den, looking at old family pictures

and albums of special events, it was fun reminiscing over times in the past spent with family when I was a young girl. Then I came across an album of personal tributes to my uncle, written for his funeral.

The first two entries were very special remembrances that impressed me greatly. One was written by his daughter-in-law, wife of his only son. My uncle had been her Sunday school teacher when she was a child and she tenderly related how he had shown her Jesus, through the scriptures, but more so through his love and care for her and the other children in the class. Historic Offerings

With as much **exhortation** to giving as there is in the Bible, it is somewhat surprising there are not more **examples** of giving in the Bible. Excluding the animal sacrifices for sin offerings, there are only a few instances of someone's actual offering to the Lord described in Scripture. Tens of thousands of offerings were given in the 4,000year span of Bible history, but only a few were so remarkable that God recorded them for future generations to study. Of course, God takes note of every offering given, but only a few so impressed God that He thought to have them written down in His holy Book.

Occasionally, we read about a wealthy donor making a large gift to his alma mater or some charitable organization. There will be write-ups in the newspaper, a mention in the evening newscast, and a plaque or some other marker with his name and generosity memorialized. Of course, every charitable gift doesn't get equal press; only those exceptional offerings that only a few are capable of. In similar fashion, I wonder if God is impressed with our giving. He sees it ... but is He impressed?

The Size of Remarkable Offerings

In Exodus 25, God instructed Moses to prepare the children of Israel for an offering. They were asked to give from the spoils of Egypt to provide material to build the Tabernacle. They had no money so they were instructed to give precious stones and metals, fabrics, skins, and spices. There was no set amount or percentage required—only that every man "giveth it willingly with his heart" (Ex. 25:2). It was not until Exodus 35 that Moses finally passed the plate, and the people began to give (35:21-29). The materials were gathered, and Moses selected two men to oversee the construction of the Tabernacle. And the people just kept giving-"And they brought yet unto him free offerings every

morning" (36:3). In fact, the people gave so much that Moses had to actually ask them to quit giving (36:5,6). The record is this: "For the stuff they had was sufficient for all the work to make it, and too much" (36:7).

I estimate that in sixteen years of pasturing, I have taken close to 2,000 offerings. Our church gives generously, but I have yet had to ask the people to quit giving. I've never had a meeting with the trustees to discuss the problem of having too much money in our funds. We've had enough, but we've never had too much. This is the kind of offering that moves the heart of God: giving that is so remarkable that He would want to write it down.

The Supply of Remarkable Offerings

In I Chronicles 22, David learned that God was not going to allow him to build the Temple. This had been David's desire: to build a magnificent house of worship worthy of Jehovah God. But David had been a man of war and God forbad him; it would be Solomon who would build the Temple. But God didn't say David couldn't give an offering!

So in his final years David began to prepare gold, silver, brass, timber and stone for Solomon to use as construction material. He gave so much that it wasn't even all counted: "Of the gold, the silver, and the brass, and the iron, there is no number" (I Ch. 22:16). But what is so remarkable about his giving is that he was giving to build a Temple he would never personally worship in. He would be dead before the Temple would be constructed, but he had a desire that future generations have a place to worship God. He prepared for giving while he was living so that after he was gone others could know and worship the Lord.

What better thing could you give to? What greater investment could you make than to make provision that others can know God—to build a temple somewhere that you may never worship in, but where others can worship the one true God? This is the kind of offering that moves the heart of God: giving that is so remarkable that He would write it down.

The Sufficiency of Remarkable Offerings

In II Chronicles 24, King Joash became vides burdened over the neglect of the Temple and set about to make preparations for its repair. A chest was set at the gate and a proclamation was made throughout Judah for the people to bring an offering. "And all brought in, and cast into the chest, until they had made an end" (II Ch. 24:10). Every day the priests would empty the

chest, and the people would fill it back up again. So much was given that the Temple was fully repaired, and enough was left over to make new serving utensils.

With the current economic uncertainty scaring everyone, churches and ministries all across the country are struggling right now to meet their financial demands. I have spoken to so many pastors whose offerings have dropped and so many missionaries who are having a tough time raising new support. My prayer is that God will increase the offerings of your church so that, just as in the days of Joash, there will be a sufficient supply for the house of God. This is the kind of giving that moves the heart of God: giving that is so remarkable that He would want to write it down.

The Sacrifice of Remarkable Offerings

In Acts 4 the church at Jerusalem was seeing exponential growth. Many members were poor and needy so others began selling their possessions and giving the money to the apostles for distribution. "Neither was there any among them that lacked: for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the prices of the things that were sold" (Acts 4:34).

Then in II Corinthians 8 the apostle Paul held up the churches in Macedonia as an example of sacrificial giving: "How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality" (II Cor. 8:2). You don't usually see trial and joy in the same sentence, nor do you usually find deep poverty and liberal giving together. What is so remarkable about these churches is not in how much they gave, but in how much they gave from. No sacrifice was too great for the church at Jerusalem, and poverty was no excuse for the churches at Macedonia. This is the kind of offering that moves the heart of God: giving that is so remarkable that He would write it down.

There is one other offering in the Bible that so moved the heart of God that He wrote it down: the offering of Christ on the cross (Heb. 10:10-14). It is remarkable for its <u>Size</u>: no one ever gave as much as He gave. It is remarkable for its <u>Supply</u>: it provides a ransom for the sins of the world. It is remarkable for its <u>Sufficiency</u>: the blood of Christ is sufficient to save every man and cleanse every sin. It is remarkable for its <u>Sacrifice</u>: the depth of the humiliation and agony of the sufferings of Christ are yet untold. This is the kind of offering that moves the heart of God: giving that is so remarkable that He would want to write it down.
