Greetings in Jesus' name,

11th being Pastor's Appreciation Day, we are dedicating this issue to the men of God. After all, since 1984 the millions of Bibles or Scripture portions that have been printed and shipped from this place have been, for the most part, because our preacher friends have prayed, given us time in their pulpits, led their churches to support us financially, and said a good word to others about VBP.

It seems that in our day of lethargy, compromise, and apostasy many of the philosophies, trends, fads, inventions, and promotions that have been passed off to the American people as "good things" by the unsaved world, are now being used by the devil to help many professing Christians, and even some churches, to self destruct. Brother Lester Roloff, one of the greatest influences for Christianity in my generation, said the introduction of the television would be the downfall of America. He was right, but obviously was not taken very seriously! Before the television invaded nearly every home in America, a weakening process had already begun. The flood of corrupt Bibles that had hit the market and the humanism taught by the public school system were a satanic effort to destroy the only absolute authority on earth and to make man his own god. Now, whenever I preach at Capitol City Baptist in Austin, Texas, this couple is always in their place, faithfully serving Christ through that good church. I have thought many times about what a wise decision they made in following the advice of their preacher. By the way, the wisest man that ever lived was called a preacher, and to follow the man of God is the route to spiritual success. Hebrews 13:7 says it this way-"Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God: whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation."

Man, by virtue of his fallen nature, is a rebel. He just doesn't like to be told what to do. However, submission to authority is an absolute necessity if a child of God is to grow spiritually and have an effective life for Christ. Hebrews 13:17 says, "Obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves: for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy, and not with grief: for that *is* unprofitable for you."

I say emphatically we should love, respect, appreciate, pray for, and follow the preacher.

Print Shop News

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Since our last Newsletter, we finished binding, trimming, and boxing a little over forty thousand Spanish New Testaments headed for Medellín, Colombia, South America. We loaded them in a container on August 12, so right now they are on the way there. Meanwhile, in the shop we are steadily working on completing roughly forty-five thousand more Spanish New Testaments that will be available as the Lord directs.

A few weeks ago we had an unexpected blessing. Someone had arranged to pick up a pallet of the Spanish New Testaments, and in the conversation about how they were going to get the New Testaments on the field, I

asked if they had the means to get items into other countries as well. One of the gentlemen made a phone call and said they could. Late last year, we had sent a container of Luganda John/Romans to Uganda, but there were about twenty thousand more that we just could not squeeze into the container. Not knowing how we would be able to get them to the field, I just did not have the heart to throw them away. Now, they are on the way to Uganda. They may not make it to the missionary we printed them for, but at least they will get to the country where we trust they will be used for the glory of God.

We are still waiting on the Lord to see which project He will provide for next. We are committed to two truckloads of Spanish Bibles, and the deal to each of those missionaries is that the project which gets funded first will get printed first. Wouldn't it be awesome if God sent in the funds to print both truckloads at the same time?! It would be a tight squeeze in the shop, but it would be more efficient. Please pray that God would have His will in this matter.

This edition of the Newsletter is dedicated to pastors. I thank God for our pastor, Bro. Tim Fellure. It is obvious that he takes his job seriously. He studies and brings convicting messages, brings in good preachers, and keeps the music on track. In fact, I have been blessed with godly men for pastors most of my Christian life. It would be impossible to tell what my life would be like today if it were not for these men. If you have a pastor, you need to uphold him both in prayer and actions. He has a tough job, and if he seems to be lacking just a little in your estimation, maybe just a little prayer and support could make a new man out of him. We all need a little help. Our pastors do so much for us; let us try to do a little for them.

My Husband is My Pastor!

The twelve tiny characters sit on his desk – little resin sheep, a flock of twelve individuals displaying different personalities. One little lamb is contentedly grazing as three others are kicking up their heels at play. One is sound asleep while another is occupied with scratching at some annoying pest on his body. Five woolly lambs are obviously focused on the shepherd, as though attentively listening to his calming voice or his call to follow. And sadly, there is one who is cast, unable to help himself to an upright position. My husband chuckles as he ponders their likeness to those in his flock at Colonial Baptist Church.

My husband was saved in 1981. Shortly thereafter the Lord called him to preach and gave him a heart's desire to be a pastor. The Lord graciously allowed that to become a reality in 1987 when he accepted the pastorate of Colonial Baptist Church. Now, 28 years later, he

is still faithfully pastoring that

same church, and in his home town! God is so good! *My husband is my pastor*, and I am a sheep in the flock. That is a unique position but it has caused me to have a much greater appreciation for pastors and a deeper insight into the challenges they face. Time and space would fail to recount the joys, heartaches, sorrows, and victories that my husband has experienced over the last 28 years.

As a shepherd he has been charged with feeding the flock and leading them to fertile pasture where



they can receive the nourishment they need to grow and flourish. My pastor spends much time and effort preparing good, solid, nutritious spiritual food for his flock. Many times I see him struggle with exactly what the Lord would have him preach or teach, but he always gives us something to feed our souls and strengthen us for life's challenges.

There are times when it seems he must play the part of a cheerleader, trying to "pump up" a congregation that has grown apathetic or that has come to "be at ease in Zion." Other times he must reprove and rebuke in order to deal with areas of sin or those of the flock who are straying.

He also must be on guard for those who would prey upon his flock and must provide protection for those in his care. Consequently, my pastor is a prime target, battling the attacks of disappointment, discouragement, fear, and frustration from the evil one who seeks to frustrate the purposes of God for him and our church. I have seen him weep over souls who reject the work of the Holy Spirit in their lives, and bear the heartache of those who disagree or become dissatisfied with some aspect of the church or ministry and leave the flock even after years of love and effort have been invested in their lives.

Yes, I can see my husband now, gazing at that little flock of twelve sheep on his desk, and his heart for the folks at Colonial Baptist Church becomes apparent. It's definitely a challenging life with unique issues to face, but I shudder to think of where he, or we, might be today had he not surrendered to the calling of God on his life.

Keep about your work

Do your work; let liars lie; let sectarians quarrel; let editors publish; let the devil do his worst. But see to it that nothing hinders you from fulfilling the work God has given you. He has not sent you to make money; He has not commanded you to get rich. He has never bidden you to defend your character nor has He bidden you to contradict falsehoods about yourself which Satan and his servants may start to peddle. If you do these things you will do nothing else; you will be at work for yourself and not for the Lord. Keep about your work. Let your aim be as steady as a star. Let the world brawl and bubble. You may be assaulted, wrangled, insulted, slandered, wounded, and rejected. You may be chased by foes, abused by them, forsaken by friend, despised and rejected of men, but see to it that with steadfast determination and with unfaltering zeal you pursue that great purpose of your life and the object of your being until at last you can say; "I have finished the work which you, dear God, have given me to do."


-Moody's Anecdotes

SPECIAL FAVOR

Someone has designated October as Pastor Appreciation Month. I suppose whoever came up with the idea was either appreciative of his pastor, or was a pastor who wanted to be appreciated. It may have been a scheme by some pastor to get gifts from his church, and if so I thank him for his creative thinking. Nevertheless,

in honor of pastors laboring in the Word, I offer a brief meditation on pastor appreciation.

Special Favor to My Brother

Galatians 6:10 – "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, <u>ESPECIALLY</u> unto them who are of the household of faith." Of course, we should do good to all men. If a man does evil to me, it gives me no right to render evil back. There is no person alive I should hate or wish evil upon. If my enemy needs a helping hand I should extend it, even if we're not going to dinner afterwards as best friends.

But I should be especially zealous to do good to my brother in Christ. If we have the means to help one person, and one is a reprobate and one is a Christian, I have scriptural sanction to help my brother first. Just recently we took a special offering in our church to help a widow in our church with a financial need, but we didn't do that for every widow in our town. We have people stop by our church all the time asking for money, and we usually say no, but if we know one of our own families is struggling financially, we will take a special offering even without them asking for help.

It is right for you to do all the good you can to all the people you can, but your first responsibility is not to the world that doesn't love Jesus; it's to your brothers and sisters in Christ who do love Jesus. God was good to all the "ites" in the Old Testament, but He was especially good to the Israelites.

Special Provision for My Family

1 Timothy 5:8 – "But if any provide not for his own, and <u>SPECIALLY</u> for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." I may love your family, but you wouldn't believe me if I told you I loved your kids as much as my own. I buy my kids a gift for their birthday, but I'm probably not going to buy yours any. I spend crazy amounts of money on my wife with dinners, jewelry, clothes, etc. but I wouldn't spend any on yours (even if that wasn't inappropriate). You and I may help another family with a need, but we don't provide for any other family what we provide for our own.

Special Honor to My Pastor

1 Timothy 5:17 – "Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honour, **ESPECIALLY** they who labour in the word and doctrine." The world honors sports stars and TV personalities, but we should give special honor to those who minister the Word. That man who labors in the word and doctrine deserves more honor than the man who can hit a home run or dunk a basketball. That man who hides in his study trying to put together a message deserves more honor than the man who stars in a blockbuster movie. That man who can take a Bible and show you how to live according to it deserves more honor than the country singer or pop star.

Over the course of my life I have called several men my pastor. Some of those men I have lost contact with and would not see eyeto-eye with on every thing, but I am grateful for the influence they had on my life. My dad was my first pastor: he led me to Christ and taught me the Bible. He gave me a love for books, taught me how to preach, and gave me an example of holiness to strive for. I will never forget another pastor I worked for fresh out of Bible college who taught me how to weep over people and have grace to those who had fallen. A man who had a profound impact upon me as a young preacher was Pastor Bobby Thomas. Brother Thomas was a master of homiletics and expositional preaching, and it was his ministry that created a desire in me to be expositional in my own preaching.

The average church member doesn't know his pastor's burdens, his trials, his sleepless nights, his endless hours. He prepares 2-4 new sermons a week, oversees the operations of the church, prays for the flock, visits the sick, witnesses to the lost, and counsels those who come for help. Every member is open to bring him all their problems; he takes none of his to them. He is responsible for everything from the annual budget to repairing the leaky toilet. His greatest joy will be his members' spiritual growth.

Many of these pastors labor in small churches which cannot pay a full salary, but every church and every church member should do everything they can to help their pastor. The idea that we'll keep him poor, and God will keep him humble is dumb. If you have a faithful man of God standing before you every week with a message from Heaven, you cannot put too high a price on his value to your family. Give him a raise, have the church pay some of his bills, take him and his wife out to dinner, send him a card with a gift certificate to his favorite store, buy him a new suit, buy him a new car, send him on an all-expenses paid vacation, put a set of tires on his car, surprise him with a special reception, remember his birthday and anniversary, . . . And make sure you do the same for his wife. Nothing will help your pastor more than a church that honors his wife.

Do good to all men, but especially to those of the household of faith. Help every family you can, but especially make provision for your own family. Give honor to all men, but especially to that man of God whom you call pastor.
